STAR House 3 Update

When we started our construction project last year, we had little idea of what lay in store for us. Although the road to where the project stands to date has not been as smooth as we had hoped, we are making definite progress and truly feel that the remainder of the project will proceed as expected. Currently, construction is well underway and the framing is almost complete. The rough electrical and plumbing systems have been installed and approved, the heating and air conditioning installation is underway, and the roof is finished.

Any construction project comes with its own set of challenges, but this project has held many more surprises than we could ever have anticipated. During the demolition phase, we discovered many things that drove costs over what had been budgeted for.

The abatement company found additional asbestos that had to



be removed, the demolition company found stucco inside the interior walls of the structure, and these discoveries drove those line items over budget. We had planned on keeping the back patio as it was, but upon investigation, we realized that the patio was comprised only of a thin layer of concrete not capable of supporting a wheelchair ramp. Similarly, during demolition it was discovered that the "foundation" in the front of the house was merely a thin layer of concrete over asphalt. It is suspected that this area used to be the garage and was remodeled without addressing the foundation properly. This generated additional fees for the demo and hauling of the existing foundation and extra concrete costs for pouring a new one. The inspector called for additional testing in other areas of the house to ensure the entire foundation was up to code, and we were faced with the costs of this unforeseen testing.

Also, while trying to bolt into the corners of the structure, the framers discovered that there were no footings in the front of the house. The corners of the house were not anchored into the foundation, so the inspector required the architect to draw up another page of plans to address the issue and be approved by the City. Due to the fact that we experienced several challenges during the demolition phase of the construction project, we looked to develop strategies for cutting costs in some other areas. This provided us with a unique opportunity to reach out to and reconnect with several members of our community.

During our previous construction projects, we established a relationship with the manager of our local Lowe's store, Gus Wahhab. After deciding upon the appropriate appliances to include in the home, we went to Lowe's, found these items, and sat down with Gus to talk numbers. He went to his distributors to inquire as to what discounts they could give directly, and he even gave us his manager's discount on top of that. With Gus's help, we were able to purchase all appliances for the kitchen for half the cost of what we budgeted. And with only a washer and dryer left to purchase under this line item, we should be under budget. Our finish carpenter gave us his contractor's discount, saving us about \$1000 on materials, and the company producing our cabinets gave us an additional discount, saving us considerable funds in that area. Our electrician helped us to sell all of the copper plumbing that was in the demolished structure and we have kept all of the old appliances for sale at our annual yard sale to further offset costs.
